Behavioral Health and Juvenile Justice (BHJJ) Memorandum of Understanding

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), is entered into by and between the State of Ohio, Department of Youth Services (hereafter “DYS”), located at 30 W. Spring Street, 5th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215, and the Ashtabula County Juvenile Court (hereafter “Court”), located at 3816 Donahoe Drive, Ashtabula, OH, 44004 (collectively referred to hereafter as “parties”) to set forth the terms and conditions that shall apply with respect to the BHJJ initiative in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Geauga, Mahoning, and Trumbull counties in Ohio.

ARTICLE I: Authority

On 1 February 2023, DYS released the attached Behavioral Health and Juvenile Justice Request for Proposals (RFP) to provide funds for BHJJ projects. On 1 May 2023, the Court submitted a response to the RFP. Using funding provided by the Ohio Departments of Youth Services and the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS), DYS will allocate \$361,575.80, and agrees to disburse up to that amount in State Fiscal Year 2024; and DYS will allocate \$396,708.78, and agrees to disburse up to that amount in State Fiscal Year 2025 to implement the program delineated in the response to the RFP and approved by DYS and OhioMHAS.

All funds described throughout this document are contingent on the availability and approval of state funding. DYS will provide funds to implement approved program activities delineated in the response to the RFP and provide oversight of the program.

ARTICLE II: Term of Agreement

This MOU is effective when both parties have signed the document. The date of the later signature shall be the effective date. This agreement will remain in effect until 30 June 2025.

ARTICLE III: Responsibilities of DYS

- a) DYS shall provide funding to the Court to implement the BHJJ project as delineated in the response to the RFP submitted by the Court and approved by DYS and OhioMHAS.
- b) DYS shall monitor the project to verify compliance of the project activities with the activities proposed in the approved response to the RFP.
- c) DYS shall assign an employee to be available for meetings and discussions as deemed necessary.
- d) DYS shall convene and host quarterly aggregate meetings of all of the projects supported by the BHJJ initiative.

ARTICLE IV: Responsibilities of the Court

- a) The Court shall act as the administrative agent for the BHJJ project and ensure that all expenditures are handled in accordance with policies, procedures and activities prescribed by DYS.
- b) The Court shall convene quarterly meetings of the local project partners, DYS, OhioMHAS, and a representative of the Case Western Reserve University (CWRU) evaluation team.
- c) The Court shall submit completed Quarterly Common Data Tracking Forms and Quarterly Common Funding Report Forms on the following dates (SFY 2024: 15 October 2023, 15 January 2024, 15 April 2024, and 15 July 2024. SFY2025: 15 October 2024 15 January 2025; 15 April 2025, and 15 July 2025).
- d) The Court shall electronically submit project evaluation data to the CWRU evaluation portal as prescribed in the evaluation data submission protocol provided by CWRU.
- e) The Court shall reconcile grant expenditures quarterly and alert the DYS contact (identified in Article IX) of projected unspent grant funds for each fiscal year by May 20th of each fiscal year.
- f) The Court may enter into agreements or administer contracts with public or private entities to fulfill specific objectives of the project.
- g) The Court may be subject to audit.

ARTICLE V: Confidentiality

The parties acknowledge that information transmitted or disclosed pursuant to this MOU may be protected by state and/or federal confidentiality laws or regulations. Neither party shall use or disclose any information concerning project participants for any purpose unless necessary to the administration of DYS' or the Court's responsibilities under this MOU, unless the disclosure is expressly permitted by the person to whom it pertains or is made pursuant to applicable state and/or federal laws and regulations. The Court agrees to follow all applicable laws and regulations prior to further disclosure.

ARTICLE VI: Termination

Either party may terminate this MOU by providing written notice 30 days prior to the intended termination date. The method of written notification shall be certified U.S. mail sent to the addresses set forth within this document. The 30-day period shall begin upon receipt by the receiving party.

ARTICLE VII: Liability

No party shall be liable to any party for any loss, damage, liability claim or cause of action for damage to or destruction of property or for injury to or death of persons arising solely from any act or omission by the parties, officers, agents, or employees. Further, no party is liable for any loss or inaccuracy of data or information.

ARTICLE VIII: Entire Agreement

This MOU, attached RFP, and attached response to RFP constitute the complete understanding of the parties and merge and supersede any and all other discussions, agreements and understandings, either oral or written, between the parties with respect to the subject matter thereof.

ARTICLE IX: Notices

Any notices, requests, correspondence, or other communications related to this MOU shall be in writing and be personally delivered, sent via email if mutually agreed upon, sent by ordinary U.S. mail, or commercial express delivery to the addresses set forth below:

Behavioral Health and Juvenile Justice Request for Proposals

Introduction

This Request for Proposals (RFP) builds upon the earlier generations of the mental health service activities for juvenile justice-involved youth and supports a solid foundation of community collaboration. It is expected that through the funding and implementation of local projects, youth with serious emotional disturbances and/or substance use disorders and who are involved with, or at risk to become involved with, the juvenile justice system will remain in their community with appropriate services/supports. Local systems will continue to enhance and expand the current service and support systems and related knowledge base for this population. Improvements may include prevention, early identification, evidence based/informed practices and treatment models; and, sharing resources; and developing partnerships between youth, caregivers, community service systems, and their counterparts at the state level.

For the purposes of this project/initiative, behavioral health refers to both mental health/illness and substance use disorders.

All activities and proposed local awards described throughout this announcement are contingent upon funding availability and final funding approval. The Ohio Department of Youth Services (DYS) and Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) reserve the right to make no award, make an award for a lesser amount, make an alternative award for the specified project, or make an award for a shorter duration. The Departments reserve the right to ask clarifying questions, issue conditional awards, and negotiate a best and final proposal with one or more applicants(s). The Departments reserve the right to waive errors and omissions that do not materially affect the proposal. Errors and omissions may also result in lower evaluation scores or rejection of the proposal.

As part of the initiative, the Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Boards (ADAMH Boards) and juvenile courts are required to participate in scheduled meetings and support the initiative's quality assurance measures, as well as meet the criteria listed in the application. Behavioral health outcome measures, and those specific to reoffending, are required for all participants. Awardees are required to participate in evaluation activities developed and administered by the Begun Center for Violence Prevention, Research and Education at Case Western Reserve University.

For the purpose of this solicitation, funds may not be used for "out-of-home placement" which is defined as "a referral for private out-of-home placement to address the primary treatment need of a youth." Funds may be used to provide services to families with the intent of expediting a youth's return from "out-of-home" placement and/or to facilitate a successful return from "out-of-home" placement.

Availability of Funds

Funds are to be available for state fiscal years (SFY) 2024 & (SFY) 2025 (1 July 2023 to 30 June 2025) for the development, implementation, evaluation, and management of this initiative. The response submitted should be for the length of the project (24 months). There is no pre-determined amount per proposal and the final awards will, in part, depend on the quality of responses received, past performance with the BHJJ initiative (if applicable), the focus area, the projected impact on the number of commitments to DYS and the amounts requested and approved.

The number of youths expected to be diverted into community services will be a factor in the award process. In addition, the respondent must address its ability to serve the racial/ethnic population mix that is locally committed to DYS. To determine the rate of commitment and demographics of the target population refer to Profile of Youth Adjudicated or Committed for Felony Offenses (SFY) 2022, which can be accessed at:

The funds for this project are primarily Ohio General Revenue Funds but may include federal pass-through grant funds. Funds will be distributed to county Juvenile Courts by DYS and require a corresponding agreement/Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between DYS and the Juvenile Court. DYS will develop the agreement/MOU to include the final award amount and provide it to the respective Juvenile Courts for review and approval. Fiscal requirements established by DYS for payment of funds must be met.

Basic program and fiscal data will be submitted to DYS on a quarterly basis using Attachments 3 and 4.

All other data related to the project will be collected through the evaluation conducted by the Begun Center for Violence Prevention Research and Education at Case Western Reserve University.

Eligibility and Qualifications of the Respondent

Those eligible for funds include partnerships of the Juvenile Court and ADAMH Board and any one or more of the following:

County Family and Children First Councils

Parent/Family organizations (e.g. National Alliance on Mental Illness local affiliates, Youth Move, ...)

Regional DYS Parole, JFS/CSB

Other partners may be included such as School Districts, Health Departments, Universities, Boards of Developmental Disabilities, and behavioral health agencies or providers.

Respondents must provide an agreement (Memorandum of Understanding) detailing the proposed function(s) of each partner in the project. **Each partner must sign the agreement.**

The Respondent **must also provide documentation** of the active involvement of parents/families in the development of the proposal, and the ongoing implementation of the BHJJ project. Respondents should briefly describe the process used at the local level to develop the proposal.

The Respondent must **demonstrate implementation of the SAMHSA defined System of Care framework.** Information on System of Care can be found here:

The Respondent **must identify the Juvenile Court as the Administrative/Fiscal Agent.** The Administrative/Fiscal Agent shall ensure that all expenditures are handled in accordance with policies, procedures and activities prescribed by DYS in the agreement/memorandum of understanding. The Administrative/Fiscal Agent may enter into agreements or administer contracts with public or private entities to fulfill specific objectives of the project. The Administrative/Fiscal Agent may be subject to audit. Respondents should also state why the partnership or collaborative is qualified clinically and organizationally to provide the service activities and supports needed by the target population and fulfill the requirements as outlined in this Request for Proposals (RFP).

The Respondent **must discuss the number of youth historically committed to DYS** and also the number of youth historically placed in Community Corrections Facilities (CCFs) by the participating court(s) and **must forecast the impact** the proposed project will have upon maintaining or reducing the current level of commitment to DYS, CCFs, and/or other out of home placements.

The Respondent will be **required to hire or dedicate a half-time person as local match** for the purposes of information gathering, data collection and information management. The half-time person will interact with the program evaluator (Begun Center for Violence Prevention, Research and Education at Case Western Reserve University).

The half-time person cannot be a clinician or part of a clinical treatment team. The position must be reflected in the respondent's Table of Organization. Respondents must submit a Position Description and resume for the individual dedicated to information gathering, data collection and information management.

Due Dates and Submission

Proposals are to be submitted electronically by 5:00PM EST on 1 May 2023. Electronically submitted proposals are to be submitted as one PDF document. The page limit of the project narrative is 25 pages; this does not include attachments such as charts/models/data. Proposals must be 12-point Times New-Roman font, double-spaced with 1-inch margins and borders. To address questions, a **Virtual Bidders' Conference will be held on 6 March 2023 from 10:00AM to 11:30AM EST (connection information can be located at the bottom of this document)**. While participation in the bidders' conference is not mandatory this will be the only opportunity to ask questions. After this all questions will be referred to the Request for Proposal (RFP).

Program Narrative – Selection Criteria

Ohio and national research studies support that many youths involved in the juvenile justice system also have co-occurring behavioral health care needs, particularly serious emotional disturbance, and substance abuse. Research has also demonstrated that the unique needs of special populations (e.g., females, LGBTQI) within the juvenile justice system often go unmet. This DYS and OhioMHAS initiative is directed toward enhancing and expanding the local systems' options to serve youth who have serious behavioral healthcare needs and who are involved in, or at risk for involvement in, the juvenile justice system. The initiative is designed to transform the child-serving systems' ability to identify, assess, evaluate, and treat multi-need, multi-system youth. The initiative is intended to accomplish this in ways that are encompassing of parents and families, are culturally competent, and include gender-specific approaches. It is expected that the projects include the implementation and evaluation of effective and evidence-based/informed practices for these youth, development and/or enhancement of additional components of community-based care, or development/implementation of specialized courts/dockets, and will have strong system coordination with services and supports in the community. Emphasis is placed on serving the ethnic/racial population representative of the youth committed to DYS from the participating counties. The selection criteria for this RFP are provided below.

Respondents are expected to format their proposal by addressing the following criteria and providing a response under each heading and criterion.

Abstract (10 points)

1. The abstract should identify the ADAMH Board(s), the Juvenile Court(s), and local collaborating partners; the amount of funding requested in each state fiscal year (SFY) 2024 & (SFY) 2025; the projected number of unique youth to be served over the life of the grant, and the number of youth projected to be admitted to the project by each grant year (SFY) 2024 & (SFY) 2025; the amount of funding provided each fiscal year as local match; the projected Medicaid reimbursement for each fiscal year; and the projected private insurance reimbursement for each fiscal year.
2. Provide a brief description delineating the goals of the project; the population to be served; the evidence-based/informed services that will be used; and a projected start date.

Statement of the Problem (5 points)

1. Briefly describe the nature of the problem(s) the program will address.
2. Provide local or state data to substantiate the problem exists.
3. Discuss the effects of the problem on the target population.
4. Discuss the barriers that currently impede services/treatment of the target population.

Behavioral Health and Juvenile Justice Request for Proposals

Target Population (10 points)

1. Provide a detailed description of the target population to be served by the project.
2. Describe any tools used to screen and/or assess the risk and needs of the target population and when the screens and assessments will be performed (e.g., mental health screener/assessment, substance-abuse screener/assessment, psychosocial assessment, Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS), Children's Global Assessment Scale, scholastic achievement testing, MAYSI-2, etc.).
3. Explain when the Ohio Youth Assessment System (OYAS) will be administered for the target population and how it will inform the selection of youth for the program and the services provided.

Selected Intervention (25 points)

1. Describe the youth- and/or family-focused, community-based intervention(s) that will be used to address the mental health and/or substance use needs of youth and/or families.
2. Provide the appropriate research citation(s) substantiating the intervention is effective in addressing the needs of your target population. If the selected intervention(s) appear on SAMHSA's Evidence-Based Practices Resource Center or CrimeSolutions.Gov registry, please provide the appropriate link(s).
3. Explain why the intervention was selected.
4. Describe how the selected intervention(s) removes barriers to services and treatment of the target population.
5. Describe the process for identifying youth; engaging youth/families in the selected intervention; how progress will be measured; provide project specific definitions of successful, neutral, and unsuccessful discharge; and how outcomes will be measured.
6. Describe the fidelity, adherence, and outcome requirements established by the model developer and explain how they will be achieved.
7. Provide a model overview (a flow chart or some other graphic depiction of how the system operates and points of linkage and collaboration) of the continuum, identifying points of linkage and collaboration with specific attention to points of entry/referral into the project. Respondents should identify the screening and/or assessment tools used to determine entry/referral into the project.

Commitment History and Projected Decrease in Commitments and/or Placements (5 points)

1. Provide the historical number of commitments of youth to DYS from the participating juvenile court(s).
2. Estimate the number of DYS commitments for (SFY) 2024 & (SFY) 2025 in all participating counties of the project.
3. Describe how the proposed project is expected to have an impact on reducing or maintaining the current level of commitment to DYS.
 - a. If the participating juvenile court(s) has few commitments to DYS, explain how the proposed services will impact other facets of local child serving agencies, such as reducing the number of out-of-home placements financed by the juvenile court(s) or the public children services agency(ies).

Qualifications of Respondent and Partners (15 points)

1. Describe how the partnership/collaborative is qualified clinically and organizationally to provide the service activities and supports needed by the target population and fulfill the requirements as outlined in this RFP.
2. Describe the process used at the local level to obtain the active involvement of parents/families in the development of the proposal.
3. Provide information about experience implementing a BHJJ project or similar project in your community.
 - a. Existing BHJJ projects must describe:
 - i. the number and type of youth served during the (SFY) 2022 & (SFY) 2023 funding cycle
 - ii. the number of youths originally projected to participate in the (SFY) 2022 & (SFY) 2023 application
 - iii. the program completion rates
 - iv. compliance with the CWRU research protocol
 - v. any barriers experienced related to successful program implementation.
4. Attach the position description and resume of the half-time data collection person for information gathering data collection and information management.
 - a. The half-time person will interact with the program evaluator (Begun Center for Violence Prevention, Research and Education at Case Western Reserve University).
 - i. Provide the qualifications of the half-time data collection person for information gathering data collection and information management.
 - ii. The half-time data collection person cannot be a clinician or part of a project clinical treatment team
5. Insert Tables of Organization depicting key staff, including the data collection person.
 - a. The table should include, at a minimum, the Board, juvenile court, treatment provider(s) and data collection position

Budget and Budget Narrative (Does not count toward the 20-page project narrative limit) (15 points)

1. Complete the attached Budget Summary Template (Attachment 2).
 - a. Include the total cost of the project for each state fiscal year (SFY) 2024 & (SFY) 2025 with all funding sources and potential funding sources identified within the template.
 - b. Include the amount of matching funds available. Match can include:
 - i. Other local systems funds (e.g., pooled funds)
 - ii. Projections of first- and third-party revenue for allowable billable service activities.
 - iii. Identify any other resources to be committed to this project (e.g., in-kind).
2. Indirect costs associated with grant funds for this project may not exceed 7%.
 - a. Indirect cost is that of the Administrative/Fiscal Agent.
3. Provide detailed narrative explaining each category of the budget.
 - a. Include in the budget narrative a Statement of Assurance that these grant funds will not supplant current local, state and federal funds for current service activities.
 - b. Include in the budget narrative a Statement of Assurance that the respondent will pursue appropriate first- and third-party payers and will work with the State in securing non-grant

funding for this project.

- i. Particularly Title IV-E and Medicaid funding.
 - ii. Can include Healthy Start, EPSDT, TANF and WIAO Reentry initiatives as appropriate.
4. If miscellaneous costs are included, please explain why they are a part of the grant.
 5. If you have included trainings/certification in your proposal, reimbursement should be proportional to the FTE charged to the grant.

Statement of Sustainability (5 Points)

1. Describe the plan for continuation of the project as the grant funds phase out.

Statements of Assurance and Other Attachments (10 Points)

1. Memorandum of Understanding **signed by all project partners.**
 - a. The MOU must clearly define the roles and responsibilities of all partners and identify the Juvenile Court as the Administrative/Fiscal Agent.
2. The respondent must provide assurance that it will work with DYS, OhioMHAS, and the Case Western Reserve University evaluation team on participating in an independent process and outcomes evaluation of the project. This will include data collection and submission by specific deadlines, clarification of data, participation in meetings with the evaluation team as needed, and review and comment on draft evaluation summaries.
3. The respondent must provide assurance that they will participate in the statewide evaluation of the BHJJ program conducted through a partnership between the State Departments and the Begun Center for Violence Prevention Research and Education at Case Western Reserve University (CWRU). The evaluation is a critical part of the project and designed to evaluate the effectiveness of the program. If chosen for funding, the respondent agrees to collect and electronically submit various surveys, questionnaires, and juvenile court data for youth and families served by the project to CWRU.
4. The respondent must provide assurance that they will convene quarterly project partnerships meeting that will include, at a minimum, representative from the Court, the Board, partner services providers, OhioMHAS, ODYS and CWRU.
5. The respondent must provide assurance that they will participate in quarterly hybrid joint Targeted RECLAIM and Behavioral Health Juvenile Justice meetings. At a minimum, representative from the Court, the Board, partner services providers are expected to participate.
