TARGETED RECLAIM IS A FUNDING INITIATIVE DESIGNED TO PROMOTE THE USE OF MODEL AND EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAMS TO DIVERT APPROPRIATE FELONY YOUTH FROM DYS COMMITMENT AND INTO EFFECTIVE COMMUNITY-BASED ALTERNATIVES. THROUGH THIS INITIATIVE, PARTICIPATING COUNTY JUVENILE COURTS SELECT AND IMPLEMENT PROGRAMMING IN ORDER TO MEET A GOAL OF REDUCED ADMISSIONS TO DYS. FUNDS ARE AWARDED, BUDGETED AND EXPENDED IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE COURTS' RECLAIM OHIO PROGRAMS AND SERVICES.

REQUIREMENTS:

Only fifteen (15) counties are eligible to apply for funding using the Targeted RECLAIM Narrative. These counties include Allen, Ashtabula, Butler, Cuyahoga, Franklin, Hamilton, Licking, Lorain, Lucas, Mahoning, Medina, Montgomery, Stark, Summit, and Trumbull Counties. This application must be signed by the administrative judge and is due at the Bureau of Courts and Community Services no later than July 1, 2020. Applications will be selected based on available funds and the following requirements:

- Judges must express that they agree to the FY 2021 targeted number of DYS admissions.
- All programs funded must be either model or evidenced-based programs and approved by the University of Cincinnati and/or Case Western Reserve University.
- In addition to the targeted number of DYS admissions, all Targeted RECLAIM funded programs MUST establish a program-based outcome measure and track the outcome of all youth released from programming for a minimum of 12 months.
- Programs must be culturally competent and Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC) needs to be addressed.
- Courts shall demonstrate that other evidence-informed or model programs are in place in the county and are at least partly funded through RECLAIM and/or BHJJ.
- Courts must agree that DYS can refer committed (low risk to reoffend) youth back to programs, with consent of the court.
- Courts must submit tracking data on youth served as require and participate in quarterly work group meetings.
- Courts must adhere to quality assurance standards to ensure program fidelity; quality assurance, including training, coaching, data collection and evaluation provided through contracts with the University of Cincinnati and Case Western Reserve University.

The FY 2021 expectation is for courts to maintain or decrease the number of DYS admissions achieved in FY 2020. Courts with significant admission increases in FY 2020 will target to maintain FY 2019 admissions levels.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Ashtabula County will strive to reduce our commitments to ODYS back to zero. The Court will continue to target those moderate to high risk youth for programming. Youth of Color that are on probation and working with Targeted RECLAIM staff, will have a success rate of 75% or higher. The Court continues to provide multiple behavior change programs that teach skills necessary to make positive and pro-social life choices. Youth that are appropriate based on risk and need will be referred to those programs. The goal for EPICS Probation is to provide targeted intervention for approximately six months unless an extension of time is deemed necessary by the supervisor. The amount of contact/service hours for each youth will be determined by their risk and need level. The Pre-Trial Services Officer that was added has worked with the same population, only prior to adjudication. This has allowed services to be in place at a much earlier time and will hopefully address the youth that obtain additional charges prior to adjudication because of unaddressed issues. Epics will remain the primary intervention for Targeted Programming. Youth learn skills such as emotional regulation, skill streaming, cognitive restructuring and problem solving. During meetings with youth staff teach and model skills to address behaviors that are problematic for the youth. The use of behavior chains, cost benefit analysis, skill streaming and setting goals are all tools that the officer employs. Each Epics session follows the model of check in, review, intervention and homework. A sanction and incentive grid has been added for consistency purposes with all youth in the program. The Court focuses on the strengths that the youth possess and tries to build upon those. For the final six months of the fiscal year, the court will partner with an agency to provide a Sexualized Behavior-Program. These funds will only be used if the client has private insurance. The Court has seen an increase of juvenile sex offenders. This program will aim to keep these youth in the community and receive services and cognitive behavioral strategies. Success is measured by keeping the youth in the community and not placing them in any type of congregate care due to their delinquent behavior. Referral to EPICS Probation is made through a court order placing a youth on formal supervision, referral to Pre-Trial services will be through a formal filing with the court for a

misdeemeanor or felony charge and the youth scores moderate to high risk on the OYAS. Again, success for both pre-trial and probation services is to provide services to youth in the community to keep them from penetrating the system further and ultimately avoid commitment to ODYS.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

The Court contracts with the University of Cincinnati to provide quality assurance and program evaluation. The Court participates in regular coaching sessions, booster trainings and phone consultations when needed and/or recommended. The Chief Probation Officer will be trained in coding and coaching to provide internal quality assurance for staff. The Chief Probation Officer and consultant from UC will provide training for staff on documentation for service delivery and interventions utilized for each session. Regular file and case reviews by the CPO will occur and be documented as an additional internal measure. Each Probation Officer will have 3 coaching sessions with the UC Consultant. The CPO will attend any training necessary for the Internal quality assurance for the program. The Court is actively involved in action planning with UCCI to provide better outcomes for its youth and families.
