MISSION STATEMENT**

The Ashtabula County Court of Common Pleas, Juvenile Division, is committed to administering juvenile justice and protecting the rights and serving the best interests of children, families, parents and the community. Our mission is as follows:

1. To provide for the care, protection, and mental and physical development of children;
2. To provide supervision, care and rehabilitation, whenever possible, in a family environment, separating the child from his or her parents only when necessary for his or her welfare or in the interests of public safety;
3. To provide judicial procedures in which the parties are assured of a fair hearing, and their constitutional and other legal rights are recognized and enforced.

JUDGE

The Honorable Albert S. Camplese has served as the Juvenile/Probate Judge since 2015. Previously, he served as judge for the Ashtabula City Municipal Court for 22 years.

Three of the magistrates conduct hearings in delinquency, traffic, dependency, neglect, abuse, unruly, motions for permanent custody and custody cases. The third magistrate hears most of the Child Support Enforcement Agency cases such as parentage, support, custody and uniform reciprocal enforcement support actions.

ADMINISTRATION

Andrew J Misiak, Court Administrator

The Court Administrator is responsible for managing and directing all aspects of the Court, Resource Center and contracted detention. The day to day operations include business affairs, human resources, court hearings, public and community relations, overseeing specialized dockets, security, communication, programs and services provided by or through the Court. Writes and monitors all grant funding, tracks outcomes and follows up with officials.

Karen A Capstick, Grant/Finance Manager

The Grant/Finance Manager handles all of the daily operations concerning supplies, payroll and budgets. Assists in program development and is responsible to provide financial and administrative advice and support services. Monitors all grant funding, tracks outcomes and follows up with officials.

Stephen A. Keates, Chief Probation Officer

The primary goal of the Probation Department is to provide services to adjudicated youth which will further protect the safety of the public. The Chief Probation Officer's main responsibility is to supervise the probation staff and aid them in providing services to the youth assigned to their caseload.

Caron Fenton, Diversion Supervisor

The Diversion Supervisor monitors all diversion staff and is in charge of scheduling for the resource center. Diversion is a primary program for the court. The Supervisor assists staff and makes recommendations to keep youth from going through the official court process, avoid arrest, conviction and a criminal record.

Jeanine L. DiMare Chief Deputy Clerk

The Chief Deputy Clerk processes, maintains and supervises all aspects of the clerk's office. Ensures effective case management and prepares monthly and yearly reports as required. This position also supervises/reconciles all court costs, fines, fees and assists the public to resolve complex issues.

Greta L. Moore Administrative Assistant

The Administrative Assistant prepares comprehensive memoranda, reports, and correspondence; orders, proposed procedures and local rules. The assistant helps with formulation, implementation, monitoring and modification of organizational policy and court rules based upon appropriate statutes and operation procedures.

Courtside Operations

Clerk Department

The Clerk Department is responsible for scheduling all cases that come through the court. Clerks must create and maintain orderly and accurate files that are accessible to all authorized parties. The department handles all fines and costs, processes fee applications that are submitted by counsel and the public. The clerk department includes the, Chief Deputy Clerk and Deputy Clerks. All are essential to the operation of the court.

Court Security/Bailiff

All officers are responsible for ensuring the safety and security of the court. Officers must operate all security and court computer equipment. They also bailiff for the Judge and Magistrates and ensure that hearings move in an organized fashion.

Diversion/Probation Departments and Court Programs

Diversion/Probation

Diversion/Probation Officers monitor the youth's behavior in the community for the court. Staff has regular contact with parents, guardians, school personnel, social service agencies and other entities as it relates to the youth. The Diversion Officers monitor youth and redirect behavior with the goal of avoiding the creation of an official record. Each diversion case reviewed individually. Cases types include unruly charges, and delinquencies based upon misdemeanor and felony offenses. Youth who are placed on probation have an official court case. Youth can be placed on probation for misdemeanor or felony level delinquency offenses. All court programs are evidence-based. They must be supported by evidence, and proven to be effective. The Ashtabula County Court of Common Pleas, Juvenile Division is committed to administering juvenile justice and protecting the rights and serving the best interest of children, families, parents and community.

Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI)

The Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI) kicked-off in Ohio in August 2010 with five of the largest counties: Cuyahoga, Franklin, Lucas, Montgomery and Summit. The initiative expanded in 2013 to include Marion, Mahoning and Trumbull Counties and in 2017 added Ashtabula and Warren Counties respectively. More recently, Delaware, Greene, Lorain, Hamilton, Paulding, Stark and Wayne counties have been added. The Ohio Department of Youth Services and seventeen of Ohio's counties are partnering with the Annie E. Casey Foundation to

implement JDAI in Ohio. This partnership is consistent with the ODYS's reform efforts and commitment to a community-based service delivery system. JDAI efforts in Ohio enhance reform strategies already underway. JDAI assists jurisdictions in making more prudent use of secure detention. It promotes efficient use of resources and supports public safety. JDAI creates additional options for youth taken into custody. Expected outcomes include reducing racial disparities, improving school completion rates and lowering re-offense rates. JDAI utilizes 8 core strategies: collaboration, data driven decisions, objective admission criteria, alternatives to detention, case processing reforms, special detention cases, reducing racial and ethnic disparities and conditions of confinement.

Resource Center

The Ashtabula County Juvenile Court Resource Center [RC] opened in November of 2017. The center is located in the basement of the Ashtabula City Municipal Building. The goal of the resource center is to intervene in the youth's life and his/her family life in order to improve the youth's behavior without the need for official charges. Youth are referred to the RC by parents, schools, law enforcement and the prosecutor's office. The center is a key tool for the court. Screening and assessments are conducted, and referrals are made for necessary services. All probation, diversion, community service, drug/alcohol treatment and truancy intervention staff are located at the Resource Center. The center is currently open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is the entry point for all youth in Ashtabula County. The center has demonstrated by intervening and serving the right youth at the right time with the right programs.

The Ashtabula County Juvenile Court offers many groups and programs for our youth. The RC stresses two primary engagement methods, to wit: Effective Practices for Community Supervision Training (EPICS) and Family EPICS. These approaches are demonstrated to be the most effective way to reduce criminal thinking and action. *Cognitive Behavioral Interventions – A Comprehensive Curriculum (CBI-CC)* is designed to provide a thorough intervention that broadly targets all criminogenic needs. As the name suggests, this intervention relies on a cognitive behavioral approach to teach participants strategies to manage risk factors. The program places heavy emphasis on skill building activities to assist with cognitive, social, emotional, and coping skill development.

Boys Council / Girl's Circle

Boys Council: "The Council is a strengths-based group approach to promote healthy masculinity development for boys and young men from ages 9-18. The Council focuses on boys' natural strengths and broadens their understanding about being male in today's world. The Council engages boys in activities, dialogue, and self-expression to question stereotypical concepts. By promoting valuable relationships with peers and adult facilitators, The Council increases boys' emotional, social and cultural

literacy. In a safe and action-oriented context, boys can identify healthy and unhealthy ideas about what it means to be male.” –Quoted from The Council Facilitator Manuel

Girls Circle: “Girl’s Circle is a model of structured support for girls from 9-18 years. It is designed to foster self-esteem, help girls maintain authentic connection with peers and adult women in their community, counter trends toward self-doubt, and allow for genuine self-expression through verbal sharing and creative activity” –Quoted from the Girl’s Circle Facilitator Manuel

Thinking for a Change

Thinking for a Change (T4C) is a cognitive-behavioral therapy (CBT) program that includes social skills development, and the development of problem-solving skills. Aggression Replacement Training (ART) is a cognitive behavioral intervention to help children and adolescents improve social skill competence and moral reasoning, better manage anger, and reduce aggressive behavior and ultimately reduce recidivism. Other groups and services include The Parent Project, which is the largest court mandated and juvenile diversion program in the country. The Parent Project is a behavior modification based parenting program for self and system referred parents of at risk or out of control youth. Mediation is utilized for youth and parents to help solve issues before cases are officially filed in Court. It is also used for custody and visitation cases.

Multisystemic Therapy

Multisystemic Therapy (MST) is an intensive family and community-based treatment program that focuses on addressing all environmental systems that impact chronic and violent juvenile offenders -- their homes and families, schools and teachers, neighborhoods and friends. MST recognizes that each system plays a critical role in a youth's world and each system requires attention when effective change is needed to improve the quality of life for youth and their families. MST works with the toughest offenders, ages 12 through 17, who have a very long history of arrests.

MST clinicians go to where the child is and are on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They work intensively with parents and caregivers to put them in control. The therapist works with the caregivers to keep the adolescent focused on school and gaining job skills. The therapist and caregivers introduce the youth to sports and recreational activities as an alternative to spending time with negative peer groups. MST is possible in Ashtabula County because of a collaborative grant with Trumbull, Mahoning and Geauga Counties.

Electronic Surveillance

The Court provides electronic monitoring surveillance and tracks youth through Satellite Tracking of People LLC. A blutag device is placed on the youth’s ankle and is tracked through the VeriTracks system. The whereabouts of the youth are monitored 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Electronic Monitoring is a community-based alternative to detention for those juveniles

who are identified to be high risk through the Ohio Risk Assessment System (OYAS) or are court ordered. If a youth has any appointments or is employed they must provide verification of this to the Court or Resource Center.

Surveillance

The Court surveillance officer travels throughout the county in the evenings and on weekends to the youth's home to ensure they are complying with court and diversion orders for house arrest and/or curfew. The officer may make contact at home, school, work or any other location that the youth may be located. Notifications are logged daily.

Drug and Alcohol Screening

The Court refer youth for drug and alcohol assessments when needed. It is vital for the court to get to the root of the problem that is done by screening tools and assessments. Groups for at-risk youth are held by local agencies and partnerships. Treatment agencies help young people address their drug problems as well as their co-occurring life skill deficits, situational problems, and psychological problems.

Community Service

We offer many different opportunities for youth to complete community service. The Court employs a community service coordinator that monitors youth in the community and tracks all hours. The coordinator offers support to the community and provides youth with the ability to complete hours while learning a helpful skill, for instance gardening or knitting. The court is always looking to provide youth with more interesting opportunities to complete hours.

DETENTION

The Ashtabula County Juvenile Court uses detention to protect public safety and to provide a safe, orderly environment for residents and staff. The Court currently contracts with Mahoning and Trumbull counties for detention bed space. The Court closed its secure detention center in April, 2018.

FAMILY DRUG COURT (FDC)

The mission of the Ashtabula County Family Drug Court is to improve the safety and welfare of children while supporting the recovery of their parents from alcohol and drug

addiction through comprehensive treatment services and judicial supervision. This program is designed to provide support by linking families with services needed to complete their goal of family reunification or their children remaining in the home, and to help them establish a solid foundation in recovery. FDC was certified as a specialized docket by the Supreme Court of Ohio in October of 2017. The Court submitted for re-certification in February of 2019 and was approved.

Community Counseling Center provides Alcohol and Drug Assessment; Individual, Group, and Family Counseling, Intensive Outpatient Counseling, Case Management, and Aftercare Services. Community Counseling Center also has a Forensic Partnership Recovery Program in collaboration with the Ashtabula County Probation Department that provides services specifically geared toward opiate-addicted individuals currently on probation. In addition, Community Counseling Center provides Medication Assisted Treatment using Suboxone and Vivitrol, and provides substance abuse and mental health treatment to individuals currently housed in the Ashtabula County Jail.

Lake Area Recovery Center provides Alcohol and Drug Assessment; Individual, Group, and Family Support services, Intensive Outpatient Counseling, Case Management, Recovery Coaching, Aftercare and Recovery Housing. Turning Point is a non-medical drug and alcohol residential facility for both men and women. Due to funding sources, males interested in Turning Point must be referred by a probation or parole officer. Liberty House is a ½ house for males also run by Lake Area Recovery Center. Lake Area Recovery Center also provides Residential Substance Abuse Treatment services (RSAT) in the Ashtabula County Jail.

Cadence Care Network, formerly Homes for Kids, Inc./Child & Family Solutions provides an array of in-home/community behavioral health services to youth and families in Ashtabula County. Cadence Care Network's work in Ashtabula County started by providing Multisystemic Therapy (MST) in 2014. MST is an intensive family and community-based treatment program that integrates intensive community psychiatric supportive treatment (CPST) service, mental health assessment, crisis response, behavioral health & family counseling, and social services with the goal of either preventing the out-of-home placement of the youth or facilitating a successful transition back home. MST focuses on addressing all environmental systems that impact chronic and violent juvenile offenders, their homes and families, schools and teachers, neighborhoods, and friends. Cadence Care Network also contracts with the Ashtabula County Juvenile Court to provide a Pretrial Case Manager, which is a grant-funded position to work in partnership with the ACJC Pretrial Services Officer from the ACJC Probation Department. The Pretrial Case Manager works directly with the Ashtabula Juvenile Court Pretrial Program and provides behavioral health services to youth and their families in the home and/or community utilizing interventions that address symptoms, behaviors, emotions and thought processes that assist the youth and/or family members in eliminating barriers specifically in regards to behaviors that would deepen the youth's involvement in the juvenile justice system. Cadence Care Network also provides youth respite services through grant funding from the Ashtabula MHRB and through the Caresource Respite Program, in partnership with the Ohio Children's Alliance, to mentor young people and model skills that will help them successfully minimize the negative impact of behavioral health issues teach and reinforce social, daily-living, and community functioning skills as relevant to a young person through role play skill development and practice. Cadence Care Network also provides youth peer support services through the Summit Strong Families Safe Communities grant to provide community-based discovery and recovery oriented supportive services. The goal of such services is to help transition aged youth focus on discovery, recovery, and resiliency principles that empower them to integrate, function, and succeed in their communities (home, school, work, and neighborhood). Cadence Care Network works with Family Drug Court through the completion of the North Carolina Family Assessment Scales General +Reunification (NCFAS-G+R) with each individual and their family upon being accepted into Family Drug Court. Cadence Care Network upon completion of the NCFAS G+R works with families to develop their Family Assessment Plan, which is then provided to the FDC Treatment Team to assist the individual and their family in utilizing their strengths to meet their goals. Cadence Care Network is also available to complete Clinical Assessments for children of participants, if identified on the NCFAS G+R as a need and will then refer to local agencies for services as recommended based on Clinical Assessment results. Cadence Care Network also provides foster care services in Ashtabula County to include the Emergency Foster Care Program, which exists to provide youth who have been charged with Domestic Violence an alternative to detention. In certain cases, this may also be used for unruly or other misdemeanor charges where a parent is unable or unwilling to take the youth. Youth charged with Domestic Violence will be screened by Resource Center staff and if appropriate, the youth will be referred to temporary placement in lieu of an official detention intake.
